Principal's Address:

I am so proud of all the Academy has achieved over the past few years and want to thank you as parents for playing a leading role in the continued success of St Mark's. I would like to take this opportunity to remind you of some of these below:

- 1. The standout moment for me this year came when the Academy celebrated winning the 2020 Renaissance Lockdown Learning Awards for Going the Extra Mile. Judges' comments commended the way staff continued to transform in the face of the pandemic.
- 2. As a community of transformation, we regularly open our doors to inspectors to review our approach. It is with great pride I share the news with parents that, following a safeguarding review this June, the Academy's safeguarding practices were described as "world class." I would like to say a heartfelt thank you to all staff for keeping our children safe, especially our dedicated Safeguarding Team.

- 3. In June this year, our Student Council members received the SSAT Student and Pupil Leadership Accreditation. This formally recognises students' leadership skills, encompassing all activities students are engaged in whether it's in the classroom, across the school, or in the wider community. I am so proud of their achievement.
- 4. On 12th July we welcomed four visitors from Anthem Trust and our Local Governing Body into the Academy to review the Quality of Education, attendance, student behaviour and safeguarding at the Academy. We were joined by, Andy Yarrow (CEO Anthem Trust), Anne Turner (Education Director within Anthem Trust), lane Coley (Education Director within Anthem Trust) and Elizabeth Fitzpatrick (Vice Chair of our Local Governing Board). It was a day full of things to celebrate and highlighted what an exceptional community we are with young people who behave in line with our values every day.

Two particular strengths noted were our exceptional behaviour and safeguarding practices and our commitment to decolonising the curriculum so that it does not reflect the views and experiences of one group. The message from all reviewers was that Ofsted Outstanding is ours for the taking and you have my word that I will not stop until this is achieved for the young people we serve.

Next academic year we will continue to embed ambitious and broad our curriculum and bring back a vast range of extra-curricular opportunities to allow us to celebrate the unique gifts of every child. Outstanding Work


Sensational Science



Design Technology

The creative juices of our students have truly been flowing!

In Design and Technology, students were taught about upcycling which is where you take an object that is no longer in use and you alter, repair or use it to make something of higher value! Give it a new lease of life – it's part of the sustainability focus in the DT curriculum which explores the 6R's: Reduce, Reuse, Repair, Recycle, Rethink and Reuse!

Students either brought in an old garment from home or used fabric that has been donated to the school to create a pouch.

The pouches could have been for a pencil case, glasses case, oyster card holder any type of storage they wanted to create.

They used the following skills: Sewing machines, Fabric Patterns, Fabric Painting and hand-sewn Applique.

Let's All Accelerate!

English- Accelerated Reader

As part of our commitment to ensuring that all students maximise their potential and are equipped to access the rigors of the KS3 and KS4 curriculum, all year 7, 8 and 9 students will take part in an online reading intervention programme called Accelerated Reader by Renaissance learning.

Over the course of the next academic year, all students in years 7, 8 and 9 will take termly online reading tests known as the STAR test. This is an online test which generates questions to assess the reading ability of each child. Depending on whether a child answers correctly or not, the level of the next question is adjusted, making sure that each child has a bespoke set of questions, suitable for their reading ability. This then provides teachers with a child's reading age, standardised scores and importantly a 'zpd' (Zone of Proximal Development). Once the initial testing is complete, students will be told what their reading zpd/level is, or the books in the library that match this. This is within a range and equates to a whole section of books, colour coded in the library.



Students will be given a unique username and password, which will allow students to login and take reading tests once they have read a book, they'll receive immediate feedback (passing the quiz is an indication that your child understood what was read). Staff will also be able to access books and revision tools for KS4 using our digital library 'MyOn'. 65% of the content on the website is non-fiction and is a fantastic revision. tool.

The entire school community will be able to track how many books our students read, the difficulty of each book and chart their progress. Parents and carers will also be given the login details to track their child's progress.

Generally, pupils who are offered Accelerated Reader made 3 months' additional progress in reading compared to other similar pupils. For pupils eligible for free school meals, the figure was 5 months additional progress.

We look forward to seeing our students reading abilities grow and flourish!

Flying High

Our High Attainers

This year has been an academic year like no other! With the school community adjusting to life within a pandemic, our High Attainer students also had their own adjustments to undertake. Trips to university campuses were replaced with virtual tours, UCAS interview practice and guest speakers were seen through the big screen that is Microsoft Teams.

Our High Attainer students have welcomed a wealth of different opportunities and taken part in many programmes in order to broaden their horizons. This included two of our Year 10 students, Sarah Akyeampong-Asante and Ruby Giddy, who were accepted onto a prestigious online programme run by Target Oxbridge. This programme provides Black Afro-Caribbean students and mixed-race students with Black heritage the opportunity to gain an early insight into life at Cambridge and how to secure a place in the future.

Our latest cohort of Year 7 High Attainers embarked upon the newly founded Thinker's Project. This was a year-long project that saw our students go from interviewing a journalist from The Guardian, to learning how to critically analyse film and cinema.

St. Mark's also partnered with The Brilliant Club to provide excellent programmes of study and research for our KS3 and KS4 High Attainers. The Scholars Programme flagship element of was the partnership and during the lockdown, ten students embarked upon a STEM project where, under the tutelage of a UCL PhD student, they were tasked with writing a 2,000-essay discussing the risks benefits of genetic testing. C.J. Skrzypczyk, who completed the programme said, "The Scholars Programme has been an amazing opportunity to learn more about genetics but also more about university style learning and how to write essays using things like footnotes and references. It's made me realise I really do want to get to university and start thinking more about what exactly my route is for the future."



Our Student Leaders Nationally Recognised

Student Leadership Accreditation

The Student Leadership Accreditation (SLA) is an innovative way of recognising students' leadership skills and the impact that they have in the classroom, across the school, and in the wider community

Ten key skills that young people need to be successful leaders are identified, and grouped them into three core themes: developing myself, contributing to my community, and working with others. Pupils can gain this award in either a Bronze, Silver or Gold Level.

Our Student Council have worked extremely hard over the year completing courses, fundraising events and implementing the new water bottle scheme in line with our environmentally-friendly ethos. The students even attended a live virtual conference over Teams whilst the school was closed.

They then had to gather evidence for each of the 10 sections and create an evidence folder to prove they have reached the level they are aiming for.

Well done to the Student Council members. They should feel extremely proud of themselves and this prestigious award is also widely recognised so will be extremely valuable in life after St Marks.

WE can make a difference!



The St Mark's Student Council have been working on a very important initiative that will have a great impact community. It is in collaboration with WE an international charity educational partner. WE Schools is a yearlong social action programme nurtures compassion in students and gives them the tools to create transformative social change. WE Charity launched a Queens Commonwealth Trust Award (QCT) where they gave schools the opportunity to bid for some money with a project idea they would like to implement within their school.

The St Mark's Student Council put together a long proposal with the idea of designing re-usable water bottles for each student to have and to help the community and school to become plastic free and save the environment.

The Student Council were successful in their bid and secured £1000 grant money! The student council then began the research process and look into different water bottles designs. They carried out some student surveys by asking the students at St Mark's what they liked about certain bottles. The student council also held assemblies to explain the importance of being plastic free and small changes everyone can make in their daily life to help save the planet.

Once the designs and pricing had been finalised the water bottles were ordered. The students at St Mark's now have their own St Mark's branded bottle which they can fill up at break and lunch time at the hydration station. This is an initiative that will hopefully continue each year and through fundraising new bottles will be brought for the incoming year 7s. A small change can make a big difference to saving our planet.

We look forward to welcoming back all the students in September and wish you all a wonderful summer.









Sixth Form News
